#### City Managers Report – Highlights August 9th, 2021

#### Pop-up Patios & Social Districts

#### Pop-ups

Kate White is wrapping up her survey and background work on Pop-up patios. Staff will bring a recommendation for Council to consider for the '22 season at a future meeting.

#### **Social District**

Reminder of previous approvals contained within agenda packet. Note from Kate White, "So far, I have talked to 10 different communities around Michigan that have their social districts up and running: Holland, Zeeland, Grand Rapids, St. Joseph, Muskegon, Rockford, Lowell, Northville, Lansing and Ludington. I have also spoken to someone in Niles, but their social district just activated. Lisa Mize, the Executive Director at the CVB, helped me to distribute a brief social district survey to her member businesses via email. The survey was sent out 8/4 and I have already received 8 responses from businesses. The survey only asks their business name, whether they want the social district to continue, and asks for their recommendations on possible adjustments to the social district. The survey was designed to be short and simple with the hope that response rates will be higher than the responses received from the previous pop-up patio surveys. If response rates are poor, I will investigate other ways to gather input from the community. With the idea being that the social district will resume on Labor Day, I am investigating the possibility of putting sidewalk decals/sidewalks to better demarcate the boundaries of the social district."

#### **Oval Beach Staffing and operations**

Oval Beach continues to receive heavy use. Staffing is stable and there are no concerns to report. The ticket booth awning was damaged by a large vehicle, Scott Herbert is working with contractors on repairs.

#### **DPW Staff**

Scott Herbert has hired a replacement for the DPW staff; a Mr. Chad Bouwman who began work on August the 2<sup>nd</sup>. An additional full time DPW staff position is in the process of being advertised with interviews to begin September 1, 2021.

#### <u>Blue Star Trail Update</u>

Open House for project scheduled for 8.26.21, please see the attached newsletter for more information.

#### **Floating Homes**

Ordinances approved by council at the previous meeting will become effective on Monday, August 9<sup>th</sup>.

#### Dune Ridge Updates

The Zoning Board of Appeals continued their meeting to Thursday, August 12<sup>th</sup>. They've requested that legal counsel prepare findings of fact and conclusion of law for their meeting. The direction provided by the ZBA was to deny all three variances that are under review.

#### Road resurfacing (and utility) projects

**Park Street-** The road survey has been complete for months. I anticipate that staff and Council will be prepared to re-start the conversations on the Park Street project scope in the winter months. Water service investigations and potential replacement will become a large part of the project scope.

**Campbell Road** Announcements on the road funding grant applied for jointly by Saugatuck/Douglas have been delayed about a month to the week of August 9<sup>th</sup>. Updates from our engineer on the project:

8-6-21: Water main permit went in this week. We can be out for bids while that is in process – worst case we do an addendum if there is a significant change from EGLE (not anticipated).

Bid specs are in process and a draft should be ready next week (we had been holding off on pulling them because they could change with MDOT funding, depending on how MDOT allows us to deliver the project). We'll want to review plans and specs with this group plus KLSWA before finalizing. Schedule looks something like this:

- Finalize plans and specs mid-August
- Bid opening mid-September (4-week advertisement)
- *Recommendation of Award to Douglas for the 9/20 meeting and Saugatuck's 9/27 meeting.*
- Notice of Award 9/28
- Construction starts mid October (it takes a few weeks for bonds, insurances, contracts, mobilization, etc.)
- Asphalt plants close mid-November.

8-12 weeks is a more realistic timeframe for construction. Even if we shave a week here and there from the bidding and award process, I wouldn't advise fall construction. And if we get the MDOT grant, there is time required there for getting the grant agreement in place (the plan was always to construct in spring 2021 if we got the MDOT funding). When we discussed fall

construction as an option, we were expecting to hear from MDOT early to mid-July, which is what they were originally telling us.

Another option would be to do the water main construction this fall into early winter and the road resurfacing in the spring. It makes winter maintenance a little more challenging and residents have to deal with construction mess for a much longer timeframe, but I've done that with several projects in the past.

At this point, I would recommend utility work to take place this fall, and road work to commence in the spring.

**Mill Street-** Engineer working with A1 Asphalt to schedule milling, hopefully completed before September 1.

**Maple Street-** Maple street is in need of resurfacing. However, there are three infrastructure improvement projects that should coincide with the repairs, which include:

- Elevating Maple Street at the intersection of North Street, including the potential for adding culverts.
- Stormwater Improvements at Maple and Mason Street, addressing a resident concern that increased water runoff is causing erosion issues in an adjacent creek.
- Water service investigation and replacement.

Given the number of infrastructure improvements needed, this looks to be a spring '21 project.

**Hoffman Street sanitary project-** a note from the engineer as of 7.26.21- *We compiled all of the relevant background information we have in terms of plans, sketches, GIS. The next step will be to do some televising to trace the laterals on that block. I reached out to Plummers to see if it is something they can help us with. If I don't hear back soon, I'll try some others.* 

I spoke to Kreig at Rapid Flush who is doing the work for 314 Butler. I am fairly confident that they will need to cut across Hoffman this fall, but we want to have a better understanding of the surrounding properties' connections in case that changes the strategy.

#### Radar Signs & temporary traffic light & pedestrian crossing

Radar sign ordered for Blue Star Highway. Working with Allegan County Sheriff Department on deployment.

#### Milfoil update

Second round of treatment complete. Visual inspections reflect a noticeable reduction in milfoil.

#### AT&T & Verizon Cellular Facilities

No updates provided by the partner company to AT&T regarding their exploration of the radar tower. The Verizon permits for small cell technology have been provided to legal counsel for review, please anticipate seeing the permits on an upcoming agenda. One permit application

locates a small cell in the Historic District, and staff plans to present this permit to the Historic District Committee for review and comment before bringing to Council.

#### **City Hall Office Space**

Thanks to a Saugatuck resident, I had a meeting at HermanMiller to begin strategizing on new office layout. The new office layout will likely bring recommendations on some interior renovations. The basic idea is to declutter, and to provide additional office space. I errantly mentioned the lead time on furniture to be eight months at a previous meeting, the actual lead time is 8-10 weeks.

#### **Elections**

City Clerk, Padley Gallagher managed the August election extremely well. Thank you to our election inspectors for their assistance.

## Blue Star Non-Motorized Trail Information and Update

Open House for community feedback on the progress of the Blue Star Trail to be held on Tuesday, August 24th from 4-6 p.m. at Isabel's Market in Douglas.

The tri-community committee for the Blue Star Trail, consisting of elected officials from the City of Saugatuck, Saugatuck Township, The City of the Village of Douglas, and representatives from the Friends of the Blue Star Trail will hold an open house on Tuesday, August 24 from 4 to 6 p.m. at Isabel's Market, 310 Blue Star Highway, Douglas, to share its work to-date with residents of the area and solicit feedback on the project.

The committee resumed regular meetings earlier this year under the leadership of Saugatuck Councilperson Holly Leo, who is serving as chairperson. The committee was formed to facilitate planning and eventual construction of the Blue Star Trail through the tri-community area. A major focus of the committee's work is to establish a safe path for cyclists and pedestrians across the Blue Star Highway bridge between Saugatuck and Douglas.

"At the open house we will present the most viable route options and gain additional public input before work begins on the detailed grant application to MDOT for an October submission" Leo said. "The committee members have been working diligently and collaboratively to find solutions to enable the Blue Star Trail to become a reality."

In conjunction with C2AE of Grand Rapids, the project engineer selected last spring from among multiple candidates, the group has been collecting input from stakeholders such as emergency responders and examining potential design options for the 4.5-mile route. When completed, this section will **run from the existing trail in Douglas, north across the bridge, connect to the existing trail** in the Township, **then on to Holland Street.** The Trail will thus provide a seamless connection from Douglas to Holland, by connecting to the existing Beeline Trail in Laketown Township.

Enthusiasm for the Trail is also demonstrated by the fact that the Friends' annual fundraiser, *A Toast to the Blue Star Trail*, has sold out over a month in advance. With this enthusiasm, the Blue Star Trail Committee hopes to see the community provide their feedback on the progress they have made thus far.



### **Summary of Incidents**

- July was a month with the typically high incident call volume. We recorded 104 calls total for the month, which is the average amount, a second month in a row exceeding 100. Year to date was 534 calls or a <u>16% increase</u> compared to the same period as last year. However we are still 26 calls, or 4.6%, behind 2019 at the end of July.
- Tuesday is still the busy day compared to the rest of the week with 87 calls. Saturday is the least busy day with 64 calls. Monday, Wednesday and Sunday are slowly catching up. The hours from 10AM-1PM count for the busy time of the day, with another bumpy surge at 4-9PM.
- ✤ 38 overlapping calls continue the increase we saw in June.
- Type of calls follows a usual pattern, the EMS category counts for 69% of our volume.

Total MVIs were 11 compared to 7 in 2020, <u>57% increase</u>, and 10 in 2019, a <u>10% increase</u>. We expect to see a drop in this category since the construction zone have moved further to the north and 41 ramp is open again. Special Events are slowly starting again. Another 4 in July doubled our total for the year. A few more are lining up in the next few months.

- We had 2 natural gas leaks at the same location in Douglas that required an extensive downtime for the restaurant.
- Location of calls shows Township counts for 46%, compared to Douglas and Saugatuck City at 27%.
- Our response time for July compare to June 5:33. June showed 67 emergent calls (lights and siren) another <u>high</u> number compared to previous months and years.






## **2021 Incidents by Time of Day**

SUBJECT: Social District Reminder

#### **Recommended Motion:**

#### No action required

#### **Description:**

As a reminder, the Social District will resume the day after Labor Day. I've included the plan that was presented to Council when the Social District was originally approved. A few improvements based on feedback from the community will include upgrades to signage and more inclusive approach for businesses that are not participating in the Social District. There was a concern by some retailers that the marketing/press release for the Social District felt exclusionary for those not participating. Signage improvements may include sidewalk stickers, similar to those used in Douglas and sturdier boundary signs affixed to utility poles.

### Downtown Saugatuck Social District Plan

#### Labor Day (first Monday in September) through Memorial Day (last Monday in May)

#### **Introduction**

In accordance with Public Act 124 of 2020 (MCL Section 436.1551) which authorizes the issuance of Social District Permits for the sale of alcohol by the MLCC, the governing body of a local governmental unit may designate a Social District within its jurisdiction and establish Commons Areas. Qualified licensees whose licensed premises are contiguous to the Commons Area within the Social District, and that have been approved for and issued a Social District Permit, may sell alcoholic liquor on their licensed premises to customers who may then consume the alcoholic liquor within a Commons Area of the Social District.

The City of Saugatuck has developed this Social District Plan and supplemental Social District Plan Maps to establish the Downtown Saugatuck Social District, the Commons Area, and provide for the administration of these areas. The Plan and associated Maps define the Downtown Social District, Commons Area, and hours of operation as well as plans for signage, security, and sanitation, and other considerations.

- A) Management. The Downtown Saugatuck Social District will be managed by the City of Saugatuck through the City Manager's Office. Day-to-day Operations will be assisted by the Allegan Sheriff's Department and the Department of Public Works.
- **B)** Social District Boundaries. The Downtown Saugatuck Social District is generally located in Downtown Saugatuck. It includes the C-1 City Center, the C-2 Water Street East, the C-1 Water Street North, and the C-2 Water Street South. A Downtown Saugatuck Social District Map is included as Appendix A to this plan.
- **C) Commons Area.** The Commons Area within the Downtown Social District is defined on the Downtown Saugatuck Social District Commons Area Map included as Appendix A.
- D) Businesses within the Downtown Saugatuck Social District.
  - 1) Liquor Licenses Eligible for Social District Permit. As of February 8, 2021, the following businesses located within the Downtown Social District are eligible to receive a Social District Permit:
    - i. Sand Bar Saloon 141 Butler St.
    - ii. Coral Gables etc. 220 Water St.
    - iii. Marro's Restaurant 147 Water St.
    - iv. The Butler 40 Butler St
    - v. Wally's 128 Hoffman St.
    - vi. Phil's Bar and Grill 215 Butler St.
    - vii. Wicks Park Bar and Grill 449 Water St.
    - viii. Scooters Café and Pizzeria 322 Culver St.

- ix. Bowdies 230 Culver St.
- x. Loco Burrito 322 Culver St.
- xi. Mermaid Bar and Grill 360 Water St. Units 1-6 and 12.
- **xii.** Fish Camp 149 Griffith St.
- xiii. Coppercraft Distillery 360 Water St. Units 9, 10, and 11.
- **xiv.** The Barge 528 Water St.
- xv. Retro Boat Rentals 730 Water St.
- xvi. The Mitten Brewing Company 329 Water St.
- xvii. Grow A Saugatuck Diner 302 Culver St.
- xviii. Pumpernnickel's 202 Butler St.
- **xix.** Coast 236 236 Culver St.
- **xx.** New Holland Brewing 201 Culver St. Unit 3.
- xxi. Butter and Whiskey- 220 Culver St.
- 2) Businesses Ineligible to allow Alcohol on Premises. As per MCL 436.1913, downtown commercial establishments that sell food but are not licensed under the Michigan Liquor Control Code (Act 58 of 1998) are not permitted to allow the consumption of alcoholic liquor on its premises. Other businesses, including those licensed under Act 58 of 1998 may otherwise be restricted by one or more sections of the Act.
- **3)** Businesses Eligible to allow Alcohol on Premises. Other businesses located in the Downtown Social District that are not otherwise restricted from allowing alcohol on their premises by the Michigan Liquor Control Code or other State or local law may allow beverages from the Downtown Saugatuck Social District in their store if their business is accessible from the Commons Area in the District. Such businesses choosing to allow alcohol in their establishment will be provided a window cling or other identifier by the City.
- E) Commons Area Hours of Operation. The Downtown Saugatuck Commons Area is open from Labor Day (first Monday in September) through Memorial Day (last Monday in May), seven days a week, from 11:00 am until 11:00 pm. No consumption of alcoholic beverage is permitted in the Common Areas after 11:00 pm. Social District Permit Holders must abide by all restrictions on the time of sales per according to their individual permits per Section 436.1551 of Act 58 of 1998. The consumption of alcoholic liquor from a Social District Permit Holder's container (designed per section G below) in the Commons Area may only occur during the legal hours for the sale of alcoholic liquor by the Permit Holder.
- **F) Commons Area Signage and Marking.** The Commons Area in the Downtown Saugatuck Social District will be identified with signage and/or other markings. Flyers identifying the boundaries of the Commons Area will be available at all Social District Permit Holders as well as other strategic locations.

A) Commons Area Beverage Container Identification. In order to participate, Social District Permit Holders will be required to design and provide a beverage container with the Commons Area Logo on it that will be used by all patrons in the Commons Area. The City of Saugatuck will provide to all Participating Social District Permit Holders a Commons Area Logo. This logo must be used on a beverage container, alongside the Social District Permit Holder's logo, compliant with Section 436.1551 of Act 59 of 1998, in order for the beverage to be removed by a patron into the Commons Area. Beverage containers may not be glass and the liquid capacity may not exceed 16 ounces.

#### B) Operational Considerations.


- 1) Public Safety Enforcement. All Commons Areas will be monitored by the Allegan Sheriff Deputies as part of regular patrol shifts. Patrol needs will be evaluated over the course of time as well as enhanced during activities that would be expected to draw large crowds.
- 2) Sanitation. The Commons Area will have public trash receptacles positioned as needed. Trash collection will be handled by a waste service on a regular basis. Sanitation needs, including placement of additional receptables and/or additional collection times will be evaluated over the course of time as well as enhanced during activities that would be expected to draw large crowds.
- 3) Insurance. The City will insure its management and operation of the Downtown Social District and its Commons Area through its municipal umbrella insurance policy. Participating Social District Permit Holders are responsible for their own liability insurance.
- C) Festivals/Special Events. During festivals or special events that do not include issuance of a special license by the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, the Commons Area in the Downtown Saugatuck Social District will remain open. Where a festival or event located in the Downtown Saugatuck Social District includes issuance of a special license by the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, as per Section 436.1551 of Act 58 of 1998, holders of a Social District Permit in the District shall not sell or serve alcoholic liquor to be consumed in the Commons Area.
