City Managers Report – Highlights August 23rd, 2021

Pop-up Patios & Social Districts

Pop-ups

Kate White is wrapping up her survey and background work on Pop-up patios. Staff will provide a presentation and bring recommendations for Council to consider for the '22 season at a future meeting.

Social District

Social District signage recommendations included in the agenda packet. Staff will present ideas for common area activities at a future meeting.

Oval Beach Staffing and operations

Oval Beach continues to receive heavy use. Staffing is stable and there are no concerns to report. With much of the summer help returning to school, concession stand will be open less frequently.

DPW Staff

An additional full time DPW staff position is in the process of being advertised with interviews to begin on or around September 1, 2021.

Blue Star Trail Update

Open House for project scheduled for 8.24.21.

Floating Homes

Ordinances approved by council at the previous meeting will become effective on Monday, August 9th. No additional action required by Council at this time.

Dune Ridge Updates

• On August 12, 2021, the ZBA unanimously voted to deny three variances requesting by Dune Ridge seeking authorization for a bathhouse, a 4-foot-tall solid board fence, and an 8- to 6-foot-tall privacy screen at 443 Park Street.

• While pending before the ZBA, this variance application stayed any enforcement action against the property. With a final decision on the variances issued, the City can now pursue enforcement of the zoning violations on the property.

• The City attorney and City staff are working on an enforcement letter regarding the privacy screen and are in the process of verifying other potential zoning violations on the property.

• The enforcement letter will contain corrective action deadlines for Dune Ridge to communicate its intent with respect to specific violations and either abate such violations or apply for the appropriate City approvals.

• The Council will be provided with further updates as matter progresses.

Concerns have been presented regarding construction activity at the boat slip near the Chain Ferry. The activity is related to the construction of a boat hoist (boat lift) which was permitted by EGLE in December of '20, attached to this report. Additionally, the remaining five slips were recently approved for boat hoists by EGLE (also attached).

Concerns were presented regarding the temporary attachment of a meter to the fire hydrant and use of water. The meter and temporary water use was approved by Kalamazoo Lake Water and Sewer Authority.

Road resurfacing (and utility) projects

Campbell Road Unfortunately, the City did not receive the grant.

Note from engineer: 8-6-21: Watermain permit went in this week. We can be out for bids while that is in process – worst case we do an addendum if there is a significant change from EGLE (not anticipated).

Bid specs are in process and a draft should be ready next week (we had been holding off on pulling them because they could change with MDOT funding, depending on how MDOT allows us to deliver the project). We'll want to review plans and specs with this group plus KLSWA before finalizing. Schedule looks something like this:

- Finalize plans and specs mid-August
- Bid opening mid-September (4-week advertisement)
- *Recommendation of Award to Douglas for the 9/20 meeting and Saugatuck's 9/27 meeting.*
- Notice of Award 9/28
- Construction starts mid October (it takes a few weeks for bonds, insurances, contracts, mobilization, etc.)
- Asphalt plants close mid-November.

8-12 weeks is a more realistic timeframe for construction. Even if we shave a week here and there from the bidding and award process, I wouldn't advise fall construction. And if we get the MDOT grant, there is time required there for getting the grant agreement in place (the plan was always to construct in spring 2021 if we got the MDOT funding). When we discussed fall construction as an option, we were expecting to hear from MDOT early to mid-July, which is what they were originally telling us.

Another option would be to do the water main construction this fall into early winter and the road resurfacing in the spring. It makes winter maintenance a little more challenging and residents have to deal with construction mess for a much longer timeframe, but I've done that with several projects in the past.

At this point, I would recommend utility work to take place this fall, and road work to commence in the spring.

Mill Street- Engineer working with A1 Asphalt to schedule milling, hopefully completed before September 1.

Maple Street- Maple street is in need of resurfacing. However, there are three infrastructure improvement projects that should coincide with the repairs, which include:

- Elevating Maple Street at the intersection of North Street, including the potential for adding culverts.
- Stormwater Improvements at Maple and Mason Street, addressing a resident concern that increased water runoff is causing erosion issues in an adjacent creek.
- Water service investigation and replacement.

Given the number of infrastructure improvements needed, this looks to be a spring '21 project.

Park Street- The road survey has been complete for months. I anticipate that staff and Council will be prepared to re-start the conversations on the Park Street project scope in the winter months. Water service investigations and potential replacement will become a large part of the project scope.

Hoffman Street sanitary project- a note from the engineer as of 7.26.21- *We compiled all of the relevant background information we have in terms of plans, sketches, GIS. The next step will be to do some televising to trace the laterals on that block. I reached out to Plummers to see if it is something they can help us with. If I don't hear back soon, I'll try some others.*

I spoke to Kreig at Rapid Flush who is doing the work for 314 Butler. I am fairly confident that they will need to cut across Hoffman this fall, but we want to have a better understanding of the surrounding properties' connections in case that changes the strategy.

Radar Signs & temporary traffic light & pedestrian crossing

Radar sign ordered for Blue Star Highway. Working with Allegan County Sheriff Department on deployment.

Milfoil update

Second round of treatment complete. Visual inspections reflect a noticeable reduction in milfoil.

AT&T & Verizon Cellular Facilities

No updates provided by the partner company to AT&T regarding their exploration of the radar tower. The Verizon permits for small cell technology have been provided to legal counsel for

review, please anticipate seeing the permits on an upcoming agenda. One permit application locates a small cell in the Historic District, and staff plans to present this permit to the Historic District Committee for review and comment before bringing to Council.

City Hall Office Space

Thanks to a Saugatuck resident, I had a meeting at HermanMiller to begin strategizing on new office layout. The new office layout will likely bring recommendations on some interior renovations. The basic idea is to declutter, and to provide additional office space.

This permit is being issued by the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE), Water Resources Division, under the provisions of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, 1994 PA 451, as amended (NREPA); specifically:

Part 301, Inland Lakes and Streams Part 323, Shorelands Protection and Management Part 303, Wetlands Protection Part 325, Great Lakes Submerged Lands Part 315, Dam Safety Part 353, Sand Dunes Protection and Management

Part 31, Water Resources Protection (Floodplain Regulatory Authority)

Permission is hereby granted, based on permittee assurance of adherence to State of Michigan requirements and permit conditions, to:

Authorized Activity:

Install 5 cradle boat hoists, each boat hoist being approximately 16 feet long and 16 feet wide, in existing boat slips of a permitted marina. All work shall be completed in accordance with the attached plans and the terms and conditions of this permit.

Waterbody Affected: Kalamazoo River Property Location: Allegan County, City of Saugatuck, Town/Range/Section 03N16W09, Property Tax No. 03-57-009-066-10; 03-57-009-054-00

Authority granted by this permit is subject to the following limitations:

- A. Initiation of any work on the permitted project confirms the permittee's acceptance and agreement to comply with all terms and conditions of this permit.
- B. The permittee, in exercising the authority granted by this permit, shall not cause unlawful pollution as defined by Part 31 of the NREPA.

- C. This permit shall be kept at the site of the work and available for inspection at all times during the duration of the project or until its date of expiration.
- D. All work shall be completed in accordance with the approved plans and specifications submitted with the application and/or plans and specifications attached to this permit.
- E. No attempt shall be made by the permittee to forbid the full and free use by the public of public waters at or adjacent to the structure or work approved.
- F. It is made a requirement of this permit that the permittee give notice to public utilities in accordance with 2013 PA 174 (Act 174) and comply with each of the requirements of Act 174.
- G. This permit does not convey property rights in either real estate or material, nor does it authorize any injury to private property or invasion of public or private rights, nor does it waive the necessity of seeking federal assent, all local permits, or complying with other state statutes.
- H. This permit does not prejudice or limit the right of a riparian owner or other person to institute proceedings in any circuit court of this state when necessary to protect his rights.
- I. Permittee shall notify EGLE within one week after the completion of the activity authorized by this permit by completing and forwarding the attached preaddressed postcard to the office addressed thereon.
- J. This permit shall not be assigned or transferred without the written approval of EGLE.
- K. Failure to comply with conditions of this permit may subject the permittee to revocation of permit and criminal and/or civil action as cited by the specific state act, federal act, and/or rule under which this permit is granted.
- L. All dredged or excavated materials shall be disposed of in an upland site (outside of floodplains, unless exempt under Part 31 of the NREPA, and wetlands).
- M. In issuing this permit, EGLE has relied on the information and data that the permittee has provided in connection with the submitted application for permit. If, subsequent to the issuance of a permit, such information and data prove to be false, incomplete, or inaccurate, EGLE may modify, revoke, or suspend the permit, in whole or in part, in accordance with the new information.
- N. The permittee shall indemnify and hold harmless the State of Michigan and its departments, agencies, officials, employees, agents, and representatives for any and all claims or causes of action arising from acts or omissions of the permittee, or employees, agents, or representative of the permittee, undertaken in connection with this permit. The permittee's obligation to indemnify the State of Michigan applies only if the state: (1) provides the permittee or its designated representative written notice of the claim or cause of action within 30 days after it is received by the state, and (2) consents to the permittee's participation in the proceeding on the claim or cause of action. It does not apply to contested case proceedings under the Administrative Procedures Act, 1969 PA 306, as amended, challenging the permit. This permit shall not be construed as an indemnity by the State of Michigan for the benefit of the permittee or any other person.
- O. Noncompliance with these terms and conditions and/or the initiation of other regulated activities not specifically authorized shall be cause for the modification, suspension, or revocation of this permit, in whole or in part. Further, EGLE may initiate criminal and/or civil proceedings as may be deemed necessary to correct project deficiencies, protect natural resource values, and secure compliance with statutes.
- P. If any change or deviation from the permitted activity becomes necessary, the permittee shall request, in writing, a revision of the permitted activity from EGLE. Such revision request shall include complete documentation supporting the modification and revised plans detailing the proposed modification. Proposed modifications must be approved, in writing, by EGLE prior to being implemented.
- Q. This permit may be transferred to another person upon written approval of EGLE. The permittee must submit a written request to EGLE to transfer the permit to the new owner. The new owner must also submit a written request to EGLE to accept transfer. The new owner must agree, in writing, to accept all conditions of the permit. A single letter signed by both parties that includes all the above information may be provided to EGLE. EGLE will review the request and, if approved, will provide written notification to the new owner.
- R. Prior to initiating permitted construction, the permittee is required to provide a copy of the permit to the contractor(s) for review. The property owner, contractor(s), and any agent involved in exercising the permit are held responsible to ensure that the project is constructed in accordance with all drawings and specifications. The contractor is required to provide a copy of the permit to all subcontractors doing work authorized by the permit.

- S. Construction must be undertaken and completed during the dry period of the wetland. If the area does not dry out, construction shall be done on equipment mats to prevent compaction of the soil.
- T. Authority granted by this permit does not waive permit requirements under Part 91, Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control, of the NREPA, or the need to acquire applicable permits from the County Enforcing Agent (CEA).
- U. Authority granted by this permit does not waive permit requirements under the authority of Part 305, Natural Rivers, of the NREPA. A Natural Rivers Zoning Permit may be required for construction, land alteration, streambank stabilization, or vegetation removal along or near a natural river.
- V. The permittee is cautioned that grade changes resulting in increased runoff onto adjacent property is subject to civil damage litigation.
- W. Unless specifically stated in this permit, construction pads, haul roads, temporary structures, or other structural appurtenances to be placed in a wetland or on bottomland of the water body are not authorized and shall not be constructed unless authorized by a separate permit or permit revision granted in accordance with the applicable law.
- X. For projects with potential impacts to fish spawning or migration, no work shall occur within fish spawning or migration timelines (i.e., windows) unless otherwise approved in writing by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, Fisheries Division.
- Y. Work to be done under authority of this permit is further subject to the following special instructions and specifications:
 - Authority granted by this permit does not waive any jurisdiction of the United States Army Corps of Engineers or the need for a federal permit, if required. For more information on USACE jurisdiction please contact Kristi DeFoe at <u>Kristi.M.DeFoe@usace.army.mil</u>
 - 2. No work within the water authorized by this permit is allowed from March 15 to June 30 due to critical spawning, migration, and/or recreational use periods. If a turbidity curtain is in place and can be installed prior to the spawning closure to exclude fish and pilings will be driven (not jetted) work can proceed during the closure. Turbidity curtains should be installed in a manner that will not trap fish and do not enclose active nests.
 - 3. The structure shall be of open construction without fill, maintaining free water movement and circulation.
 - 4. The proposed structure shall not unreasonably interfere with the navigability or boatability of the water involved or interfere with the riparian rights or use of the waters by others.
 - 5. Additional attachments to permitted structures, including but not limited to permanent covers, sides, or roofs, are **not** authorized by this permit.
 - 6. The project is located within a community that participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). As a participant in the NFIP, the community must comply with the Michigan Building Code (including Appendix G and listed supporting materials); the Michigan Residential Code; and Title 44 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 60, Criteria for Land Management and Use. The community is also responsible to ensure that its floodplain maps and studies are maintained to show changes to flood elevations and flood delineations as described in 44 CFR, Part 65, Identification and Mapping of Special Hazard Areas.
 - 7. The design flood or 1.0% annual chance (100-year) floodplain elevation at this location on the Kalamazoo River is 583.0 feet NAVD88.
 - 8. Any other filling, grading, or construction within the 100-year floodplain will require a separate EGLE permit before starting the work.
 - 9. All structures constructed within the floodplain or floodway shall be firmly anchored to prevent flotation or lateral movement.
 - 10. Authority granted by this permit does not waive permit or program requirements under Part 91 of the NREPA or the need to acquire applicable permits from the CEA. Please contact Allegan County Environmental Health at (269) 673-5411.
 - 11. The authority to conduct the activity as authorized by this permit is granted solely under the provisions of the governing act as identified above. This permit does not convey, provide, or otherwise imply approval of any other governing act, ordinance, or regulation, nor does it waive the permittee's

obligation to acquire any local, county, state, or federal approval or authorization necessary to conduct the activity.

- 12. No fill, excess soil, or other material shall be placed in any wetland, floodplain, or surface water area not specifically authorized by this permit, its plans, and specifications.
- 13. This permit does not authorize or sanction work that has been completed in violation of applicable federal, state, or local statutes.
- 14. The permit placard shall be kept posted at the work site in a prominent location at all times for the duration of the project or until permit expiration.
- 15. This permit is being issued for the maximum time allowed and no extensions of this permit will be granted. Initiation of the construction work authorized by this permit indicates the permittee's acceptance of this condition. The permit, when signed by EGLE, will be for a five-year period beginning on the date of issuance. If the project is not completed by the expiration date, a new permit must be sought.

Summary of Incidents

- July was a month with the typically high incident call volume. We recorded 104 calls total for the month, which is the average amount, a second month in a row exceeding 100. Year to date was 534 calls or a <u>16% increase</u> compared to the same period as last year. However we are still 26 calls, or 4.6%, behind 2019 at the end of July.
- Tuesday is still the busy day compared to the rest of the week with 87 calls. Saturday is the least busy day with 64 calls. Monday, Wednesday and Sunday are slowly catching up. The hours from 10AM-1PM count for the busy time of the day, with another bumpy surge at 4-9PM.
- ✤ 38 overlapping calls continue the increase we saw in June.
- Type of calls follows a usual pattern, the EMS category counts for 69% of our volume.

Total MVIs were 11 compared to 7 in 2020, <u>57% increase</u>, and 10 in 2019, a <u>10% increase</u>. We expect to see a drop in this category since the construction zone have moved further to the north and 41 ramp is open again. Special Events are slowly starting again. Another 4 in July doubled our total for the year. A few more are lining up in the next few months.

- We had 2 natural gas leaks at the same location in Douglas that required an extensive downtime for the restaurant.
- Location of calls shows Township counts for 46%, compared to Douglas and Saugatuck City at 27%.
- Our response time for July compare to June 5:33. June showed 67 emergent calls (lights and siren) another <u>high</u> number compared to previous months and years.



U.S. SENATOR GARY PETERS

Secures Funding for the SAFEGUARDING TOMORROW THROUGH ONGOING RISK MITIGATION (STORM) Act

in Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill

U.S. Senator Gary Peters fought for and secured \$500 million over 5 years for the *STORM Act* in the bipartisan infrastructure bill, the *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act* that passed the Senate. Peters previously authored the *STORM Act*, which was signed into law in January 2021. It created this new program, which provides support for local communities facing rising water levels, coastal erosion and funding that have put homes, small businesses, property, and communities at risk, and caused millions of dollars in damages.

Q: What does Senator Peters' STORM Act do?

Peters' STORM Act amends the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act to grant the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) authority to work with states and Indian tribal governments to establish revolving loan funds for mitigation. The revolving loan funds will be used by local governments to carry out projects that reduce natural disaster risk, including shoreline erosion, flooding and high water level.

Q: What's the significance of this funding?

Resilience and mitigation spending saves taxpayers more than \$6 for every \$1 invested. But the majority of current disaster relief programs focus on post-disaster response, rather than pre-disaster mitigation, preparation, and resilience. Planning ahead to prevent serious disruptions when a disaster strikes will reduce risks to people, property, and save taxpayer dollars.

Q: How do the revolving loan funds work?

- Unlike existing FEMA mitigation grants, the STORM Act's revolving loan funds will allow states to directly offer low-interest loans to counties and cities for mitigation projects to help reduce loss of life and property, without going through the federal grant application process.
- The loans will reach communities more quickly than other available grants and will provide an additional tool to meet the growing need to address mitigation. Loan repayment will provide states with a growing fund that they can use to continually improve resilience.

Q: What will this funding mean for Michigan?

- The revolving loan funds will allow Michigan to prioritize funding to mitigation projects that are most important to Michiganders, rather than having the federal government make those decisions.
- The funds allow Michigan to target projects in areas where we've seen major impacts from disasters, such as flooding in Southeast Michigan, and shoreline erosion and high water levels that have destroyed beaches, property and homes.
- This flexibility will allow the state to focus on protecting vulnerable communities, which have been hit particularly hard by recent extreme weather events.

Q: What types of projects will be eligible for these loans?

- Projects to help address flooding, building codes, shoreline erosion, and severe winter storms are all eligible. This could include reinforcing seawalls, improving stormwater drainage systems, and other projects that are not eligible under other grant programs.
- Additionally, the STORM Act authorizes projects that reduce disaster risks to homeowners, nonprofits and businesses, allowing for on-the-ground targeted investments in vulnerable areas that may not have received funding from other grant programs in the past.
- The law requires an annual mitigation plan from states that must go through a public comment period. This will allow a whole of community approach to mitigation, ensuring that interested stakeholders and Michiganders can have their voices heard on how the state will administer these funds.

Q: What are next steps to accessing this funding?

As FEMA begins to establish the capitalization grant program for the STORM Act, states, local governments, and community stakeholders should begin working together to identify and prioritize mitigation projects with the greatest need of funding.
